CHAIR'S REMARKS

At this juncture in global political affairs and international relations there has never been a greater need across the world for people to work for democracy, reconciliation and peacebuilding. We have seen such efforts blossom over the last 25 years in Northern Ireland/Ireland and I hope that they will continue to bear fruit to reflect unity in diversity in our restored political institutions. Such work can and should be replicated in other parts of our global world.

This compelling imperative fuelled my desire to accept the invitation to join the Board of CDPB in July 2021 and eventually to accept the unanimous support of Board colleagues to take on the mantle of Chairperson of this important organisation. I was replacing Sir Jeffrey Donaldson MP who stood down as Chair and still remains a member of the Board. CDPB owe our thanks and gratitude to Sir Jeffrey and his predecessor, Lord John Alderdice who along with other Board members provided strategic direction to ensure that our organisation continues to fulfil our objectives. We have all been ably assisted by Eva Grosman who is our Chief Executive. Eva is a powerhouse and has provided dynamic leadership in these islands in terms of peacemaking and democracy. We and the wider community owe Eva an enormous debt of gratitude and heartfelt thanks. I hope to continue to work with Eva and her team to ensure that the objectives of the organisation continue to be fulfilled.

Our democracy and peacebuilding work has been overshadowed by war in Ukraine in 2022. We have all been horrified by the scenes of mass death and destruction which we have witnessed on our television screens on a daily basis since late February. International efforts are required to work with President Zelensky to ensure that peace and democracy is secured and that the Ukrainian people can return to their homeland through a massive re-building programme for peace, prosperity and infrastructure building.

Our work has concentrated in the past year in the following areas: Fellowship programme which involved young people from across Northern Ireland coming together to work on democratic peacebuilding initiatives. This programme will continue to be delivered and sincere thanks are due to the Department of Foreign Affairs in Dublin, Irish American Partnership, our corporate partners and our mentors from business and industry for their advice, sponsorship and unfailing direction and guidance.

Other work programmes included the Unite Against Hate which was supported by the Executive Office.

Our international work focuses on engagement with colleagues in Colombia and work led by Lord Alderdice in Jerusalem.

This year also witnessed the appointment of Reeya Gadhvana as our Head of Programmes and we will continue to work with young people and internships – in fact we will be hosting two young women from Harvard in Belfast during the summer.

Notwithstanding the rigours and challenges of the pandemic over the last couple of years, our work has continued and blossomed. That bedrock of support from the wider community including business and industrial representatives is invaluable on so many levels as we continue our mission and fulfil the objectives of CDPB.

CDPB is one of the most inspiring and worthwhile organisations I have worked with, and I hope to continue to work with Eva, Board members and others to fulfil our commitment to democracy and peacebuilding locally and internationally.

Fellowship Programme for political and civic leaders in Northern Ireland

The CDPB Fellowship is an independent and non-partisan executive programme for mid-career political and civic leaders working in Northern Ireland. It aims to strengthen democracy and to ensure that the current and future cadres of political leaders in Northern Ireland are best placed to lead into the next decade and navigate through complexity.

The inaugural programme was delivered in partnership with key stakeholders, policy makers and facilitators from leading academic institutions including Blavatnik School of Government, University of Oxford, and with support from its Advisory Board, including:

The Programme began in September 2021 with the commencement taking place at Stormont, followed by a residential session at the University of Oxford where Fellows attended workshops led by world leading academics on topics ranging from systems thinking to conflict and co-operation. The remainder of the Programme saw sessions in Belfast and Dublin, tackling issues including climate change, entrepreneurship and leadership.

The Programme was finally rounded off by a graduation at Hillsborough Castle, with video message from Minister Coveney addressing the Fellows and attendance from many of the Fellowship's faculty and sponsors.

A workshop series led by experts on diversity and inclusion (Deepa Mann Kler), community relations (Sughra Ahmed) and mediation (Dorcas Crawford), teaching attendees the skills to overcome their biases, build braver communities and communicate in a healthy and conflict-free manner.

The Unite Against Hate pledge, asking people to challenge, reach out and speak out against prejudice and hate crime within Northern Ireland. This pledge received support from across the community within NI and across political parties with several MLAs signing to pledge support.

Lost Treasures of the Revolution: The Graphics of Solidarity 1980 – 1989

The Centre for Democracy and Peace Building partnered with the Polish Cultural Institute in London, hosting a unique 'Lost Treasures of Revolution' exhibition at St. John's College, University of Oxford, Coventry Cathedral and Ulster University in Belfast.

The exhibition brought together 26 Solidarity poster designs reproduced from the collection of the Victoria and Albert Museum alongside a selection of original badges and rarely seen underground stamps that bear witness to the grassroots creative spirit of the movement in the 1980s.

Solidarity was one of the biggest social movements of the 20th century. As the leading political force opposing communism in Poland during the 1980s, it paved the way for the peaceful transition to democracy in 1989. This exhibition explores the role that graphics played in building the movement and sustaining it during the difficult days of government repression and martial law. From its iconic logo to spontaneous poster designs and underground ephemera, Solidarity's printed graphics created a rich visual culture of resistance that spoke to people from all walks of society. By getting involved in making and circulating these items, often at great personal risk, many ordinary people participated in the collective and transformative work of opposition.













Belvedere Forum Warsaw

Eva Grosman, CDPB CEO attended and spoke at the Polish-British Belvedere Forum in Warsaw. The Belvedere Forum is a leading annual British and Polish dialogue that seeks to strengthen the extensive social, economic and political partnership between the two countries, and it brings together representatives from a wide range of backgrounds, including academia, business, media, think tanks, NGO's, culture, and the diaspora.



The Forum is co-hosted by Chatham House and the Polish Institute of International Affairs (PISM).

Leadership in Arts and Culture Visitor Programme

Leadership in Arts and Culture is a 3-day visitor programme developed by the Polish Cultural Institute in London in collaboration with British Council in Poland and the Centre for Democracy and Peace Building.

The programme explored how international cultural cooperation and diplomacy work in practice and provided opportunities to engage with world's leading institutions and experts, including the V&A, the National Gallery and Tate Modern. It also included meetings at the Palace of Westminster and the Polish Embassy in London.

Participants included directors of the Polish national museums and leading cultural institutions. The next phase of the programme will take place in December 2022 in Oxford.









TEDxStormont COUNTDOWN and COP26

TEDxStormont COUNTDOWN returned in 2021 with a number of events and initiatives aimed at highlighting the climate crisis in a run up to COP26 in Glasgow.

TEDxStormont hosted Shaping Our Electricity Future: Have Your Say – an online event focused on energy, partnered with RSPB NI Artist of the Year competition, and delivered a live event at Stormont coinciding with the 26th UN Climate Change Conference of the Parties (COP26).

At the main event Belfast Lord Mayor, Kate Nicholl delivered a TED talk on her commitments to making Belfast a greener society while looking to what more local governments can do to promote positive climate changes.

Group Chief Executive of Translink, Chris Conway joined the event to discuss how Northern Ireland's transport systems can evolve to become greener and more biodiverse to help meet net zero targets.

Podcaster and climate change activist Rosalind Skillen explored the climate crisis through the lens of intergenerational justice, asking us to assess the future cost of our present actions.

Sustainability advocate Susan McEwan drew on her experience in peacebuilding and reflecting on some of the thinking that has emerged following Black Lives Matters, and looked at the idea of a coalition for conscious sustainable living.

John Gilliland, Director of Global Agriculture and Sustainability at Devenish Nutrition explored how businesses are looking at green and sustainable business models to help the bid to cut carbon emissions by 2050.

Audience members also heard from Environment Minister, Edwin Poots, Poet Nandi Jola, Head of RSPB NI, Joanne Sherwood and Diversity & Inclusion Specialist, Deepa Mann-Kler.

Imagine Belfast

The Centre for Democracy and Peace Building was delighted to partner yet again with the Imagine Belfast Festival of Ideas & Politics to co-host two events.

Lord Boateng in conversation with Alfred Abolarin, Chair of the Migrant and Minority Ethnic Council Northern Ireland – an event to marking The International Day for the Elimination of Racial Discrimination and the "Anything But Steady" book launch by Dr Ofrit Liviatan, Harvard University in conversation with Professor Pete Shirlow.

Colombian Ambassador visit to Northern Ireland

The Centre for Democracy and Peace Building facilitated the visit of the new Colombian Ambassador to the UK H.E. Mr Alvaro Gomez Jaramillo and the Director for Reincorporation and Normalization Mr Andres Stapper and other officials. The aim of the visit was to share NI peace building experience and to develop and strengthen links between Northern Ireland and Colombia.

The delegation engaged with Rev Bill Shaw, 174 Trust, the Independent Monitoring Commission, including meeting with the Commissioner Monica McWilliams and the UK and Irish Joint Secretaries, and the NI Housing Executive CEO Grainia Long and Director Jennifer Hawthorne, followed by a visit to Titanic Belfast.









Jerusalem's Holy Places

Emeritus Chairman, Lord Alderdice, continues to work on democracy and peace building in various parts of the world.

CDPB is assisting him in a project addressing the conflicts over **Jerusalem's Holy Places**, which follows on from earlier work he did on the Israeli-Palestinian conflict.

Lord Alderdice is currently working on this challenging peace building venture with two distinguished colleagues - the Jewish academic, Dr Ed Kessler, President of the Woolf Institute at Cambridge, and faith and community leader, Imam Monawar Hussain, Muslim Chaplain to Eton College and Founder of The Oxford Foundation. In recent visits Lord Alderdice and his colleagues have met with Israel's President, Isaac Herzog, and Foreign Minister, Yair Lapid, as well as Christian, Muslim and Jewish leaders, the Jerusalem police, and significant NGOs, academics and activists.

The work is being supported by a charitable trust founded by Peruvian psychoanalyst, Dr Moisés Lemlij and his wife, Mimi, and is expected to continue for some time.
