But what is Unite Against Hate?

Unite Against Hate is a platform to challenge, educate and mobilise people to face the truth about hate – and end it. Launching in 2014, Unite Against Hate was formulated in response to a world that is increasingly divided, with the realisation that we can all be complicit in this division. Through challenging, educating and mobilising each other and ourselves about our own attitudes and convictions, we believe that we can work towards ending hate and building a better society for everyone.

At a glance:

The Situation

Division is on the rise: on geopolitical and local levels the world is becoming increasingly divided. Religion, race, and gender have all become polarising fault lines. In a time of heightened rhetoric and behaviour, suspicion, judgement and hate flourish. If hate is not challenged it will destroy our ability to live together.

The Insight

We can all be complicit: in this context of division people do not gravitate to where the fractures occur; when things break, people seek security at a distance from the epicentre – on the edges. As a result, people become increasingly desensitised to subtle and pervasive divisions that drive them further apart. Sometimes people can't even see the hate that has crept into their communities, their countries or themselves; and when they do, they often don't know what to do about it.

The Idea

Unite Against Hate is a platform to challenge, educate and mobilise people to face the truth about hate – and end it.

The Why

Because we believe that ending hate can build a better society for everyone.



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ONLINE AND ON-DEMAND WORKSHOPS

Our online resources were created to act as a legacy of the campaign, and to provide free online and on-demand access to the lessons of our workshops to all.

These resources are a translation of our lauded Zoom workshops, in which we tackled how to live without bias, how to build braver communities, and how to communicate in a healthy and conflict-free manner.




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

Public encouraged to Unite Against Hate



Unite Against Hate will today launch a pledge urging the public to challenge, reach out and speak out against hate in Northern Ireland.

This comes as recent PSNI statistics have shown that an average of eight hate crimes or incidents are reported to the police every day across the region, with figures of racist and sectarian incidents rising every year.

CONCLUSION

At a glance:

people attended our online workshops led by experts on diversity and inclusion, building braver communities and mediation.

people have signed our pledge so far committing to challenge, reach out and speak out against prejudice and hate crime within Northern Ireland.

9,447 people visited our Unite Against Hate Twitter page during the campaign.

Unite Against Hate had an incredibly impactful year in 2022 by drawing attention to the issues of hate crime and prejudice in Northern Ireland, teaching participants the skills to tackle this, encouraging communities to pledge to end hate crime and through the press publications surrounding the campaign which championed the voices of ethnic minorities within Northern Ireland and their experiences with hate crime and prejudice.

Other outcomes from the project were definitively an increase in confidence particularly for the panellists at the pledge launch event who felt that their voices were recognised and considered after taking part in the event. This also led to greater trust built with other attendees and consequently people from outside of their milieu. An increase in confidence also came from our final workshop which taught people the skills to handle difficult conversations with ease, and many commented stating that the lessons would be useful going forward in situations ranging from familial to organisational conversations.

Our project participants represented a broad cross-strata of communities, political affiliations, and ethnicities. The pledge itself and the lead up to the launch of the campaign received cross-community and cross-party support particularly on twitter, with tweets or videos encouraging pledgees to sign. These were posted in the community sector by representatives of the Jewish community, the polish community, and other community-building projects such as CRAIC NI. Within the political sector, we received signatures and tweets of support from the Alliance Party, SDLP, Sinn Fein, the UUP, the Green Party and the DUP. The attendees for our workshops were similarly very diverse, with attendees from the polish community, the Jewish community, the South Asian community, the Caribbean community and other faith and interest groups. We believe that we engaged with individuals throughout the programme that would not normally have engaged.

For example, one of our panellists who had not engaged in an experience like this prior sent the following feedback:

CONCLUSION, continued

Overall, the project has been incredibly successful and reached a diverse range of community groups and individuals on our journey to Unite Against Hate and end prejudice and hate crime in Northern Ireland. We gathered a phenomenal amount of support both online via Twitter across the political spectrum demonstrating a cross-party effort as well as in person with attendance at our pledge launch event at the Skainos Centre, Imagine Belfast and online presence at our workshops. We gave many people the opportunity to work with us in challenging their biases and learning the skills to be better community members and communicators, inspiring confidence, and proactivity within all involved. We also gave a voice and platform to individuals within NI at our pledge launch event and within the press to share their experiences not only of hate crime and prejudice within NI, but also the positive experiences that they have had and their ideas to make NI a more inclusive, tolerant, and safe place in which to live. We are incredibly proud of Unite Against Hate 2022 and thank all those who helped us with our aim of working towards a more united community and inspiring people to Unite Against Hate across communities, political divisions, and geographies.
